Directions: The simplest route is to make your way to the Derby Ring Road and pick up Osmaston Road at the Spider Bridge. Following this into town, the Light Alloy Foundry site is on the left just before the railway bridge. DE24 8AE will get you very close if you are using SatNav.

2.2. Ticknall Lime Kilns: Meet in Ticknall Village hall car park at 10.15 for 10.30 and we will be taken round by Rachael Hall - archaeological consultant to the National Trust. We should be finished in time for lunch at Calke Abbey for those that fancy the idea. #### 5. **Village Party.**

#### 6. **"Campaigns"**

The Well Lane right of way: The DVD of the 1762 Wyatt's map has been located and enables us to confirm in detail the location of the public bridle way mentioned in the enclosures act. We have also tracked down a photographic slide with the finger post in the Square. It is just readable and confirms the foot path to Winshill (3 miles).

#### 7. **The Archive:**

##### 7.1. Main recent additions:

- 7.1.1. We have completed the cataloguing of Bunty Marshall's Repton materials and have now started on David Guest's. The materials will be accessible by prior arrangement.
- 7.1.2. Thanks to Bunty and Joan Measham, we have copies of two comprehensive papers about the Measham Family of Repton who can be traced back to 1275. We have also received a comprehensive Measham family tree from Andy Timms who is married into the family and has traced their line back to 1675. We were able to provide Andy with Measham information and a photograph of Simney Lane showing roughly where the family were in the 1860s.
- 7.1.3. We have photographed the 1914 - 1920 Parish magazines to support the WWI research.

#### 8. **Projects:**

If you feel you can contribute to any of these projects, please let Andy Austen know.

- 8.1. We still need more help to write a visitor's history of Repton.
  - 8.2. We have still to produce a leaflet for visitors to the Commonwealth War Graves in the churchyard. These would be available in the church porch. The information is all available now.
  - 8.3. Transcription of the taped oral histories has stopped pending completion of the WWI research.
  - 8.4. Repton's bells: This research will restart once the spire is repaired and access to the belfry is again possible. We need to copy the detailed inscriptions of the 6<sup>th</sup> bell to determine if it is a Braysher bell from before 1496 or a later Leicester foundry bell.
  - 8.5. Relating the 1881 census to the 1881 map has restarted and is increasingly supported by photographic evidence from the archive.
  - 8.6. We have a number of volunteers now to make a photographic record of the village this summer but we could use more please. You need a digital camera but no special photographic skills are needed.
  - 8.7. The work on the Mitre Inn and Star public house is about as complete as we can get it. There are still some queries about the Mitre's location at the Cross between 1865 and 1875. Work on the other pubs continues.
  - 8.8. Margaret and Janine are just completing their work on those men on the WWI memorials. Janine has now moved onto WWII men and Margaret is seeking information on the men from Milton whose memorial is lost. We think all those from Milton who fell in WWI are on the Repton memorial but would like to be sure.
